


What the 50,000-Watt KOA Means to Radio Listeners

THERE IS A LITTLE GIRL in Denver who was asked the other day by her mother if she knew how to spell Denver. Without a moment's hesitation came her reply: "K—O—A Denver."

To millions of people all over the United States the relationship between Denver and Radio Station KOA is fully as close as it was in the mind of that little girl. Denver to them means KOA, and KOA to them means Denver.

Day and night, month in and month out, for practically ten years, the words "KOA Denver" have been going from Denver to the ends of the earth. And now, with wattage four times greater than it was in the past and twenty times greater than it was when KOA started, KOA enters a new period of more use, of more service, of more value.

The increased power granted to KOA by the Federal Radio Commission ranks KOA as one of the leading broadcasting stations in the United States. Only a few other stations equal KOA's 50,000 watts; none, save one, an experimental station, exceeds it. Denver, therefore, now ranks with any other city in the nation as a radio city.

According to Mr. O. B. Hanson, Technical Operations and Engineering Manager of the National Broadcasting Company, the man who designed Radio City: "KOA is technically the finest broadcasting station in the United States."

But just what will this increased power mean to the radio listener and to clients of KOA?

The answer is: It will mean improved reception at all times, during all seasons. Many radio listeners know that during day-light hours reception is not so good as after nightfall. KOA's new power will greatly eliminate this difference. And listeners know also that during the summer months static is the bane of radio reception. KOA's 50,000 watts double the strength of summer reception and minimize static. And, naturally, with four times its former power KOA will reach farther and broaden in influence.

The first KOA program was broadcast on Dec. 15, 1924. Radio then was an infant miracle. Commercial broadcasting was timidly beginning. The whole thing was pretty much of an experiment. The little station in Denver, large for those days, small for these, was granted a license to broadcast with 2,500 watts. And it began its career.

During the past ten years KOA has become an integral, a necessary part of Denver's life, of the life of the whole Rocky Mountain West, in fact. In civic matters, in championing the region, in developing Denver, and Colorado, and the West, KOA has always been conspicuous in offering its facilities in the public interest. KOA fits in with life in the Rocky Mountain West.

KOA, carrying both the Red and the Blue NBC networks, offers the finest programs in the United States, including Ed Wynn, Amos and Andy, Paul Whiteman, Jack Benny, Jack Pearl, The First Nighter, One Man's Family, Rudy Vallee, Jessica Dragonette, Boston Philharmonic Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Metropolitan Opera Company, Harry Richman, John B. Kennedy, Lanny Ross, Ben Bernie, Duke Ellington, Meredith Wilson, Guy Lombardo, Ted Fiorito, Lowell Thomas, Floyd Gibbons, light operas, international broadcasts, and scores of others.

With greatly increased power, with the finest facilities in the United States, and with the same old enthusiasm for Denver, for Colorado, for the Rocky Mountain West, KOA now enters a new period in its history.
